His Church Proposal for land development in Summer Lake Oregon.

Summary

His Church is purposing to develop acreage in Summer Lake valley.

(land description Located at the North end of the Summer Lake Basin).

The purpose and use of this property is dedicated to the preaching, publishing, and edification of the Kingdom of God according to the authority, mission and direction of the Gospel of Jesus the Christ for His purposes for His Church.

This will include, but not be limited to the following outline:

- 1. For the creation of a sustainable *religious* retreat grounds;
 - 1. Serving individuals, families, congregations and congregations of congregation; ii
 - 2. For the celebration of *religious* and spiritual festival of His life and love for one another; iii
- 2. As a conference and educational center for convocation of His servants; iv
 - 1. The edification of a refuge and sanctuary for His spiritual and temporal life in the world;
 - 2. A religious school for training ministers, missionary's, and friends of His Church; vi
 - 3. A research project facility for discovery, improvement and distributions of knowledge; vii
- 3. A place of a common community as a possession for the orders of His Church; viii
 - 1. For the purpose of Christ, His Church, His doctrines and His ordinances.

The church grounds and facilities will be the duty of the Order at White Rock to operate and maintain the property for these purposes with the aid and assistance of novices, aspirants, volunteer presbyters of His Church and/or may also be subdivided under the supervision of other orders of His Holy Church and shall be available under that supervision for other His Church congregations of record under the Accords, Guidelines and Ministrative Guidelines of His Church.

Golden Rule Policy

The policy of the Church is love. That love is always balanced with righteousness of God in the discretionary services of the people to strengthen the poor and make straight the ways of men.

Friends and Strangers Policy

The Church is to be a priest to all nation and preach the kingdom way of righteousness to all institutions. While its primary mission is the directive of Christ to feed His sheep in service of all those seeking the kingdom of God and His righteousness it is to set an example of service without force and encourage all institutions of men to adopt the same Kingdom policy.

From the Ground up Policy

This policy is born out of the command to "dress it and keep it". As stewards of the earth and brother to all mankind the labor of the Church is to bless every step and aspect from earth to final fruit. A constant attention to self-reliant sustainability shell be pursued at every opportunity.

Short Term Goals and Objectives

Our first goal is to complete the purchase the property to be held in trust for the purposes of the Church, including a national and international retreat ground, the ministers of Christ here in Summer Lake and those churches looking to His Church at Summer Lake for guidance and example.

The church is still searching for additional funding to cover the full purchase price and expanding.

The land is held by a Church institutions or Friends of His Church for church purposes. The church will continue to organize a fall camping feast/retreat to discuss and fine tune future plans for the land.

From the Ground up Policy

The policy in development is to in conjunction with the first two commands of God in the garden will include all production of consumable or useable items will be done in house from "the ground up".

This ground up policy will encourage complete control of all facets of production of any valued item to be from soil to fruit. Only after the maximum value is produced will the Church distribute the fruits of its labor for the support of the whole Church.

Laborers

Individuals are already offering their time and labor to help get things started. More help will be needed with the most urgent projects getting priority according to finances.

The Order and novices of the order are preparing to take on this task. Much work is already being done with limited space and resources. The Church is seeking the names of experienced or professional people and groups that will be able to teach skills as soon as there are sufficient facilities in place on the land.

Past efforts

The church already has the ability to produce professional videos, DVD's and books to help further training and help those missionaries and ministers in the field.

It has been leasing the land for over a decade and has developed the property for this entire time. The church has held retreats already in the area and on the land and with a little work sanitary camping facilities could be set up straightaway for our new more comprehensive and regular retreats.

Retreats are an opportunity top develop the relationships for a viable community of faith men and women by the connection of their families through fellowship and other natural means.

Overview of Long Term Development

Addition planning is needed once the land is purchased to determine type and location of facilities. We propose that a group from the local churches be formed to properly survey and plan out construction and development. A more detailed plan should be submitted and agreed upon by the Order before construction is started. What follows is an outline of the basic needs and desires. Priorities will have to be set as all funds are not yet available.

1. Retreat Grounds and Accommodations

- Convention center/meeting Hall/ will begin as a barn as funds allow
 - o Office
 - Training facilities
 - o Guest quarters for ministers, missionaries and visiting teachers
 - Prayer *closets* design for solitude and shelter with minimal impact on the nature.
 - Mobile Cabins for shelter and accommodation during work and retreat events...
 - Alternative housing such as small dome buildings.
 - The use of natural and alternative housing methods will also help the church provide information and examples to the missionaries that wish to build alternative low cost housing and shelter on the missions.
 - Emergency housing in case of disasters/ yurts etc.
 - o Industry of Church residence to engage in work
 - that makes the property and the order self-sustaining
 - Sustainable Agriculture
 - Retreat, convention and refuge grounds
 - Process surplus agriculture to full value added
 - All levels of production and value added
 - Processing from the ground up
 - Including the manufacture of equipment
 - marketing surplus in support of those serving Christ
 - Construction of yurts and other portable shelters
 - o retreats, emergency, support
- Camping and Retreat areas
 - Set of mobile restrooms.
 - Mobile Kitchen.
 - Large yurts
 - Screened gazebos for refuge from sun and bugs during meetings, lectures, and services
 - The church already has yurts that can be put up for retreats and they have plans to build a larger one for a 2010 retreat.

2. Irrigation and water conservation

Approximately 130 acres of natural meadows are flood irrigated from a artesian well and springs. A large portion of the water used in flood irrigation is lost through the ground and to evaporation on the fields and ditches. With a better delivery system so much more water could be used to provide more

hay and reclaim more land from the desert. This land could be used to provide different varieties of feed like alfalfa, oats and even grain crops such as rye & wheat. Water will also need to be diverted to gardens and orchards. A new artesian well could be drilled in strategic locations

3. Land sustainability

Major improvements to the land will be necessary. Being semi-arid and very alkaline much work on improving the soil is necessary. Most of the land is sandy alkaline soil which is poor and only supports sage brush. This provides us with a wonderful opportunity to demonstrate ways to restore and improve soil. This information can prove invaluable to those in the missions. All soil improvements and gardening techniques will be documented to provide good complete information to missionaries and ministers in the form of books, pamphlets, DVD's, audios and on site demonstrations. The church wants to eventually build:

- Permanent and Mobile Greenhouses
- Multiple garden locations to facilitate seed saving and
- demonstration of various gardening methods and practices.
- Composting areas for each garden and waste recyle
- · Orchards and woodlots
- Vineyard
- 4. Animals unique breed varieties for sustainability.
 - Fences, pens and facilities to care for animals.

x Epigeic Worm Species:

These are the surface dwellers ,such as compost worms. They include the smaller red/ brown worm species, that are to be found naturally just below the surface in rotting leaves, dung heaps and other plant litter. They are called detritivourous in that they eat detritus (waste material). They can handle cycles of variable moisture, but will not survive long in soil, unless it has been well loosened and mixed with compost or manure as they are poor diggers and need plenty of organic matter around them and must have good aeration. Their natural home is within the plant trash itself.

xi Eisenia Hortensis:

Common name: European Nightcrawler also commonly called Redworm, it is much bigger than Eisenia Fetida (foetida). It is a quick breeder and a good composter (makes plenty of castings). Much sought after for fishing bait, as it can tolerate near freezing water and is one of the few "earthworms" suitable for salt water fishing. These worms can grow up to 7 inches in length, but usually are between 3 to 4 inches. 300 to 400 worms per pound.

xii Eisenia Andreia:

Usually called the Tiger Worm, because of alternate bands of darker and lighter red colour. Often confused with Eisenia Fetida (Foetida) and to make things worse they are also known as Red Worms. Like Fetidae They are quick breeders and productive in vermicomposting and good fishing worms. They are between 2 to 3 inches long and weigh in at 900 to 1000 worms per pound. They are found throughout the world and as such are no threat to the environment if they escape. Temp range – Extremes: 38°F-88°F/Optimum 70°F -80°F.

xiii Eisenia Fetida (Foetida):

Commonest compost worm used in worm farming and easy to obtain. Usually called Red Wigglers, but also known as Red Worms, Red Wrigglers, Compost Worms, Manure Worms and Brandling Worms. They got their name of red wiggler because as fishing worms as they are active on the hook and stay alive in water for some time, although they are a bit small for this purpose. They are between 2 to 3 inches long and weigh in at 900 to 1000 worms per pound. They are quick breeders and productive in vermicomposting. They are found throughout the world and as such are no threat to the environment if they escape. Temp range – Extremes: 38°F-88°F / Optimum 70°F -80°F

xiv Endogeic Worm Species:

These are the upper soil worm species of earthworm, and are geophages as they feed on humified soil with high organic content such as found around grass roots. They make temporary burrows, which become filled with their castings and this brings nutriments to plant roots and their burrowing improves the aeration and moisture retention.

xv Anecic Worm Species.

These are the deep burrowing earthworms, such as Lumbricus Terrestris. They are not suitable for vermiculture as they are not compost worms - however in nature, they are extremely beneficial in improving the overall soil condition. Usually greyish brown, they are excellent diggers and their burrows, are semi permanent and may extend to six feet below the surface – these burrows are lined with mucus and help aerate the soil and improve water retention. The worms feed near the surface and pull down organic material deep into the ground, putting the nutriments in the worm castings exactly where the plant roots can best use them. They block the mouths of their burrows with plugs of soil and castings, to keep out unwanted pests.

xvi African Nightcrawlers:

Latin name: Eudrilus Eugeniae. These worms are much larger than Eisenia Fetida (Red Wigglers) and are commonly over six inches long. Good compost worms and great for fishing, because of their size and as they are lively on the hook and have a firm skin. They prefer temperatures of around 75°F- 85°F, but can tolerate 45°F- 90°F, cannot tolerate extreme cold and dislike disruption of environment and handling. Weight: 175 to 200 worms per pound.

xviiThe **black soldier fly**, or Hermetia illucens is a common and widespread fly of the family Stratiomyidae, whose larvae are common detritivores in compost heaps. http://www.esrint.com/pages/bioconversion.html

xviii **Darkling Beetle/Mealworm** Rearing you Need Two shallow plastic sweater boxes with lids or mealworm breeding boxes available at pet stores, Window screen material, Hot glue gun, Substrate made of wheat, oats, bran, whole wheat flour corn meal or chicken mash, Potatoes, Variety of fruits, vegetables and bread

- 2 Trim the window screen to slightly larger than the cut out areas of the lids.
- 3 Glue the screening snugly over the openings you cut into the lids making sure the screening fits securely. This provides ventilation for the mealworm colony and protection from ants and other insects. It also keeps the mealworms inside their container.

- 4 Place one container in a warm, dry area with subdued light.
- 5 Use the second container to house your mealworm colony while you clean the culture box container that you're using for mealworm breeding.
- 6 Add 1 to 2 inches of the substrate material into the box as a bedding and food source for the mealworms. Wheat, oats, bran, whole wheat flour, corn meal or chicken mash all make excellent substrate materials. Mix the substrate materials together, or use them individually.

Caring for the Mealworms

- 1 Put your mealworms into the substrate material. If possible, purchase a full culture of mealworms from a pet store or online at websites such as Sialis, Worm Man or Nature Pavillion. A full culture includes mealworms all four stages: egg, larvae, pupa and beetle. You can start with either mealworms or beetles if a full culture is not available.
- 2 Cut a potato into thin slices and place them into the substrate as a source of food. Alternatively, use a wedge of cabbage in place of the potato.
- 3 Sift out the beetles every one to two weeks, separating them from the eggs and tiny worms utilizing the second container that you prepared.
- 4 Dispose of the waste material in a garden once a month. Wash and dry the container, fill it with new substrate and sliced vegetables, and return the worms to the freshened container.
- 5 Keep your adult beetles at a humidity level of about 90 percent.
- 6 Feed the adult beetles small pieces of fruit, vegetables and bread. The breeding cycle keeps repeating itself as you repeat the steps.

Tips: Keep the temperature between 45 to 85 degrees F for your mealworm colony. Most breeders find that a temperature of approximately 77 to 80 degrees F works best for them with a humidity level of about 70 percent.

It takes about 12 weeks for a full cycle of reproduction to take place in a mealworm colony.

Place the container full of mealworms in the refrigerator if they are breeding too quickly. It stops their cycle of development until you return the container to room temperature.

Each female beetle lays about 500 eggs.

Never allow mold to grow on the mealworms food source or substrate material.

Don't change the substrate in the container too soon. Allow the mealworm colony to establish itself or you risk accidentally discarding tiny eggs and larvae that you're cultivating.

Instructions: Things You'll Need 3 plastic containers, 1 by 2 feet Bran Oatmeal (optional) Large apples 2 carrots (optional) Potato slices (optional)

- 1 Pour two inches of bran or oatmeal into the bottom of three escape-proof plastic containers. The bran or oatmeal is the main food staple for your mealworms.
- 2 Place up to 2,000 mealworms into one of the containers and store the other two.
- 3 Cut a large apple into pieces and place the pieces into the container. This will provide both food and water for the mealworms for about three days. Add another apple every three days. If you prefer, you can use two large carrots or potato slices every three days instead.
 - Wait for the mealworms to become beetles.
- 5 Transfer the beetles into the other two containers. A 1-foot by 2-foot container can hold about 2,000 mealworms or a 1,000 adult beetles. Add an apple, potato slices or carrots to each container.
- 6 Continue replacing the food as the adult beetles die and the new mealworms appear. It will take approximately 12 weeks for the mealworms to transform from eggs to grubs then into adult beetles.

Rotifers Unfortunately, rotifers on their own are very low in nutritional value-therefore gut-loading with a highly nutritious

Copepods are a more common, 'natural' food for larval fish. They are generally fast moving and highly nutritious. Larvae feeding on young copepods, called nauplii, generally enjoy superior survival rates than those feeding on rotifers. However, they are also considered by some to be more difficult to culture than rotifers.

Brine shrimp artemia hatcheryBrine shrimp are slow-moving filter feeders that are high in fats when newly hatched, and high in protein when fully grown. They are generally well accepted as a supplemental food, extremely easy to culture, but can be dangerous when used as a sole source of food, because they are not nutritionally sound. Ease of culturing and availability drives the use of these organisms as an aquaculture staple. Culturing them can be as easy as 'just add (salt) water'.
